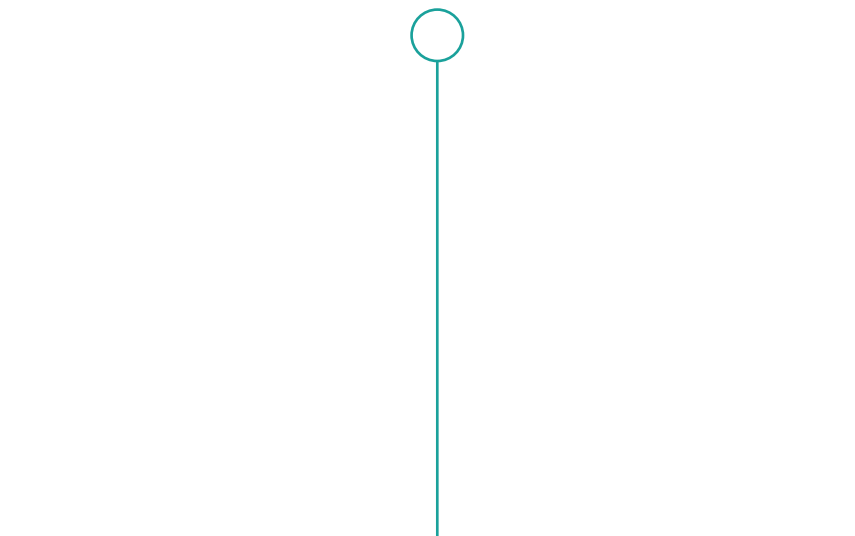

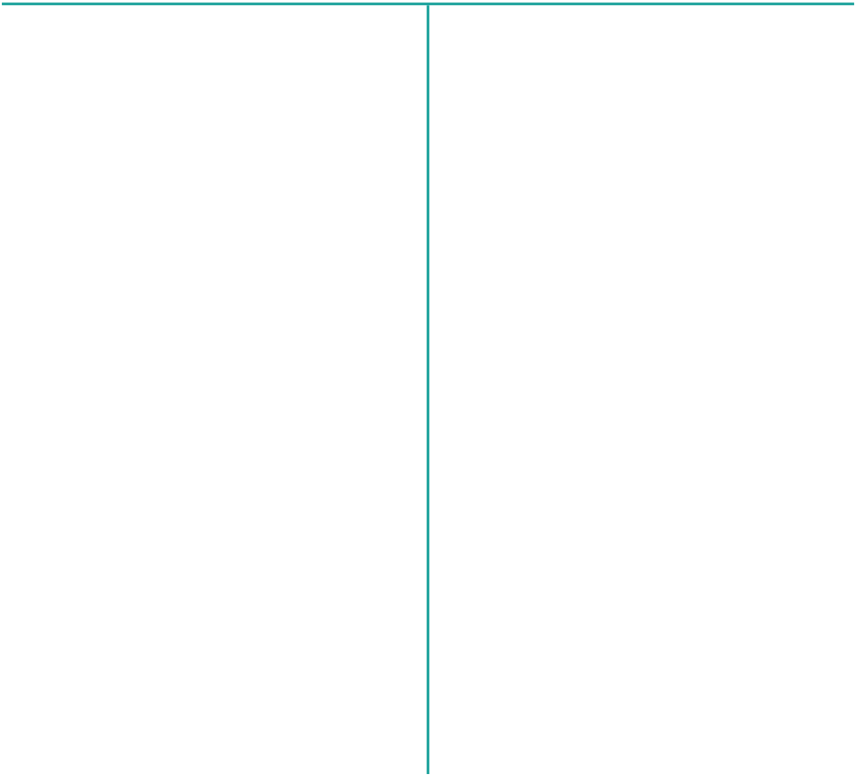

Executive Summary

Today, In our Nation Cameroon, many youths have learned and acquired marketable skills, but lack the expertise and knowledge required to position themselves in the cooperate world and earn a living; they lack mentors. This is a rising problem among Cameroonian youths as unemployment rates keep rising, many families and individuals continue to suffer from poverty, and there's low socioeconomic development.

In a bid to combat this problem, the one youth one dream conference was conceived. The Make Them Smile Foundation, a Non Governmental Organization aimed at health promotion and youth empowerment through skills acquisition, together with its Partners, under the Supervision of Miss Eliva Enanga Fule and her team who were able to conceive and realize this great initiative, in collaboration with the Regional Delegation of Youth Affairs and Civic Education of Cameroon. 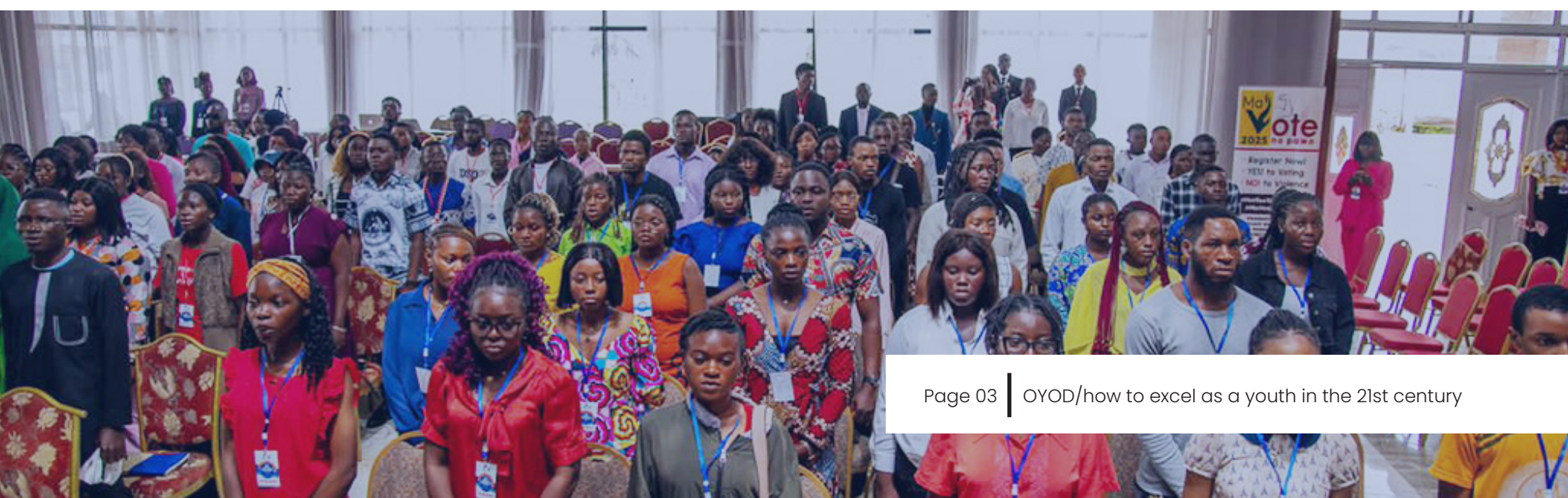
The primary objectives of the One Youth One Dream Conference were:

empowering and developing youths in Cameroon

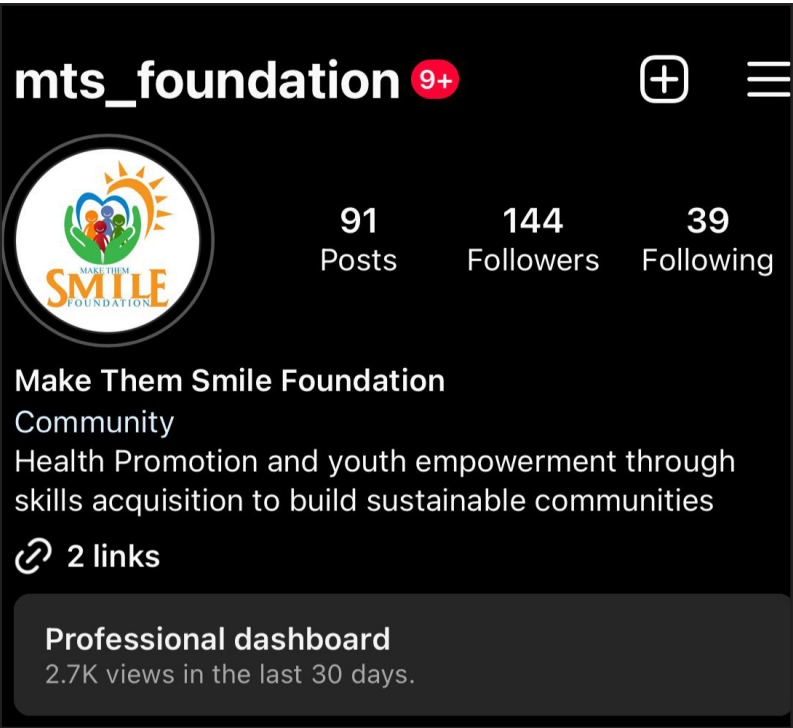
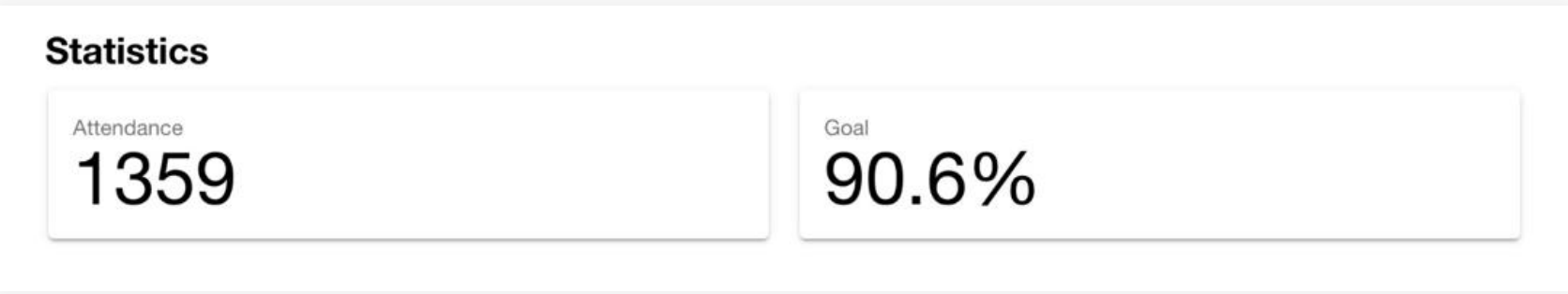
- Expanding the mentorship program to reach more participants and provide ongoing support

PANEL 1: BREAKING THE BARRIERS OF YOUTH UNEMPLOYMENT

In an engaging and thought-provoking discussion at the One Youth One Dream Conference, Mr. Oben Desmond Ashu, a Computer Software Engineer and CEO of Lambdaa, and Mme. Dongmo Madjio Linda Malvina, an innovative entrepreneur, offered invaluable insights into overcoming youth unemployment. Centering on resilience and creativity, their perspectives resonated deeply with the audience.

- **Mr. Oben Desmond** emphasized that resilience in the tech industry is a cornerstone for success. He shared how navigating the fast-paced and ever-evolving world of technology requires a strong foundation in skills and a commitment to continuous learning. In an era where opportunities often favor the well-connected, he highlighted networking as a vital tool to break barriers. Desmond urged young people to cultivate meaningful professional relationships, leveraging them not just for jobs but also for mentorship and growth. He reinforced that resilience, paired with a strong network, opens doors to opportunities that might otherwise seem unattainable.

PANEL 1: MENTAL HEALTH AND HOW IT INFLUENCE PRODUCTIVITY

During the panel discussion, experts highlighted the significant relationship between mental health and productivity.

- **Mme Maybel Etonde**, a therapist, shared her personal journey and emphasized the importance of daily emotional processing and good sleep hygiene to enhance mental well-being. She encouraged attendees to prioritize their mental health and seek help, aiming to dismantle stigma around mental health issues.
- **Dr. Esame Marietta Joso** discussed her motivation for entering the health sector, driven by personal losses due to inadequate healthcare. She advocated for public health initiatives, particularly in underserved communities, emphasizing the interconnectedness of mental health and overall health outcomes. Dr. Joso encouraged aspiring health professionals to engage in advocacy and community outreach to promote mental health awareness.

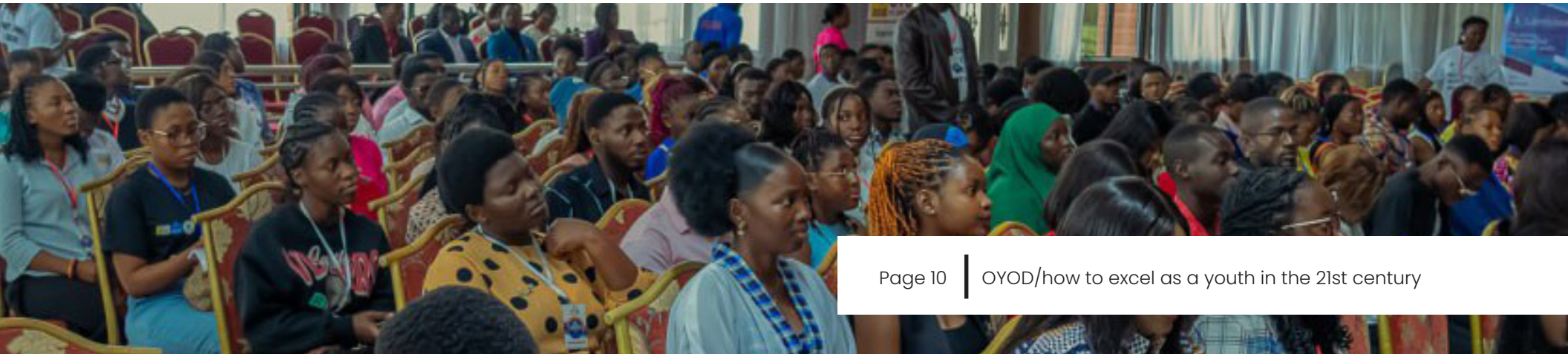
PANEL 2: BUSINESS OR JOB CREATION AS A MEANS TO BOOST ECONOMIC GROWTH

In developed and developing economies, entrepreneurship and job creation are powerful tools for addressing poverty, reducing inequality, and promoting financial stability which are all boosters of economic growth. During a very engaging and dynamic panel 2 session at OYOD 2024, Esono Jude, an Agricultural Entrepreneur and Rhoda Akale, CEO of Smart Money Tribe and Business consultant, shared invaluable insights on the topic. In Cameroon, agriculture remains the largest employer and a major export contributor, with products like cocoa, coffee, and bananas driving growth.

- **Esono Jude** discussed the innovative potential within agriculture, specifically highlighting improving agricultural processes and production by integrating technology such as precision farming into the workflow. He also spelt out many opportunities that exist in the field for youths, while encouraging them to explore agricultural ventures for innovation and entrepreneurship. Esono shared success stories of young people who have transformed traditional farming practices into thriving businesses through creativity and technology. His insights inspired many attendees to consider agriculture as a viable and impactful career path, urging them to think outside the box and leverage modern techniques to make a difference, not limiting themselves to thinking that agriculture is all about farming. Building a business is good but managing the finances and processes to sustain that business will determine its lifespan.

- **Rhoda Akale**, during the panel discussion, spotlighted financial literacy and management as key tools for sustainable business development, and personal and professional success. Rhoda highlighted key concepts such as budgeting, saving, and investing, providing practical tips on how to develop a healthy relationship with money. **Now, the big question – how do I do all these?** They sound overwhelming. To answer this question, Rhoda encouraged attendees to acquire knowledge acquisition and make informed decisions by learning from workshops, online courses, and mentorship opportunities at their disposal (some, like the OYOD Conference, are available for free). The attendees were elated with the insights provided by Esono and Rhoda, and many expressed newfound motivations to be more involved in enacting the change we want to see in the economy, shunning mere talks or complaints.

PANEL 2: FINANCIAL INDEPENDENCE FOR WOMEN AND THE LEGAL ASPECTS OF BUSINESS KNOWLEDGE FOR ASPIRING ENTREPRENEURS

- **Mme Mbua Georgette Enjema** talked on the importance of financial independence with emphasis laid on how crucial it's to women, for several reasons which included: Contribution to the Economy, being that When women achieve financial independence, they can contribute more to the economy through their work, entrepreneurship, or investments, which in turn supports community development and national growth; Freedom from Abuse and Exploitation as it reduces vulnerability to abusive relationships given women will not be dependent on a partner for financial support; Equal Opportunities, When women are financially independent, they have greater access to opportunities—whether in education, career choices or personal development. It helps bridge the gender gap in terms of economic participation and decision-making. Overall, financial independence is vital for women to live fulfilling, safe, and equitable lives. It fosters gender equity and helps create a society where everyone, regardless of gender, can thrive.
- **Barrister Clifford Akonteh**, who addressed the legal aspects of business providing vital knowledge for aspiring entrepreneurs reminded us (the youth) Aspiring entrepreneurs in Cameroon need to be familiar with several key legal aspects of business in order to establish and run a successful, legally compliant business. He talked on Business Registration and Legal Structures with emphasis on understanding types of Business Entities; Taxation and Compliance, drawing attention to the need for Entrepreneurs to understand their obligations under Cameroon's tax system and most importantly he reiterated how essential it's for young entrepreneurs to evaluate their environments, strategies, and build business structures that are both effective and sustainable for long-term success.

POLICY PAPER BY THE ONE YOUTH ONE DREAM (OYOD) 2024 CONFERENCE

Summary

How do youths excel in the 21st Century? The One Youth One Dream (OYOD) Conference is an event for youths by youths that saw the massive participation of Cameroonian youths in an all-day event in Buea, Cameroon, under the theme: *How to Excel as Youths in the Twenty-first Century*. The opening question prompted the discussions of the OYOD conference. It became evident that excelling as a Cameroonian youth in the 21st Century was tied to several factors but prominent amongst this was health, education, peace, and civic engagement of youths towards development setting up the avenues for success.

Health, Education and Peace are a right for all young people in Cameroon and everywhere. Several factors such as political, economic and social crises, corruption, and discrimination reinforce inequalities and tensions in society, which can potentially lead to or reinforce conflicts that robs Cameroonian youth of these goods and consequently their ability to excel within a non-peaceful environment that limits affects their mental health, education and civic participation. This policy paper frames the OYOD perspective on the role of young people in preventing conflicts and building peaceful societies by providing recommendations on how to support young people, youth-led and youth-serving organisations in the process of building and sustaining peaceful societies for youths to excel through health, education, and civic participation. Built upon a rights-based approach, the paper identifies five paths leading towards more peaceful societies: education, health, youth participation, social cohesion, and climate justice - which should be fostered to ensure that youths excel amply in the 21st century Cameroon.

The policy paper builds upon existing positions of the OYOD Conference, including sustainable development, youth participation, youth rights, social and economic inclusion, interregional cooperation, non-formal and formal education and civil society. The policy paper does not aim to be a comprehensive approach to the topic of health, education, civic participation, peace and security as this requires a tailored and multidimensional approach with more to go on that we could not address in the span of the conference. This paper is a commitment of the OYOD to engage in advocacy processes to reinforce the recognition and the role of young people, youth-led and youth-serving organisations as actors in building peaceful societies that foster health, education and civic participation. It provides the following recommendations for governments, institutions and stakeholders to ensure youth-inclusive policies and rights-based approach to enable youths excel.

Policy Recommendations

Here are the recommendations gleaned from the youths, youth-led and youth-serving organizations guided by the insights from the OYOD Conference and related activities. The recommendations seek to foster a supportive environment where Cameroonian youths can excel in the 21st century focusing on health, education, civic participation, and peacebuilding and climate change, ensuring a holistic approach to youth development.



1. PROMOTE ACCESSIBLE AND AFFORDABLE HEALTHCARE, CLEANLINESS AND CLIMATE JUSTICE

- Expand the availability of subsidized health services to ensure all youths can afford essential health checks and treatments like during the OYOD health campaigns.
- Continuously conduct health awareness campaigns to educate youths about their health and encourage proactive health management.
- Increase access to mental health services and support systems, particularly for youths affected by political, economic, and social crises.
- Encourage youth participation in community clean-up campaigns and partner with local councils and climate-based organizations to maintain urban cleanliness.
- Educate youths on the importance of a clean environment for public health and their role in maintaining it as individuals as part of their social responsibility and the fight against climate change.
- Encourage youths to engage in climate justice advocacy at local, national, and international levels and support policies that mitigate climate change and protect vulnerable communities with adaptation financing.

2. IMPROVE YOUTH PARTICIPATORY MECHANISMS FOR INCLUSION AND DEVELOPMENT

- Include youth in decision-making through the involvement of youth-led and youth-serving organizations and National Youth Councils in policy-making processes related to health, education, peace, security, and entrepreneurship from preparation to evaluation processes.
- Promote youth-led initiatives and acknowledge the contributions of young people in civic engagement and entrepreneurship.
- Protect youths from all forms of sexual and gender-based violence by eliminating all forms of sexual and gender-based violence.
- Recognise the role of youths and youth-led organizations as actors building enterprising and peaceful societies, and their role in promoting a culture of peace, tolerance, intercultural and interreligious dialogue that aims at discouraging their participation in acts of violence, terrorism, nepotism, tribalism and all forms of discrimination.

- Support the creation of quality youth participation and representation mechanisms in relevant bodies engaging in capacity building, career orientation, peacebuilding and youth policies.
- Better understand the needs of youth and civil societies affected by conflict and violent crime, gender-based, political and domestic violence, and extremism by focusing on “human security” instead of “state security”.

3. IMPROVE INFORMATION DISSEMINATION AND ENSURE ACCESSIBILITY FOR YOUTHS WITH DISABILITIES

- Use social media and dynamic websites to share information about youth opportunities, making it accessible beyond traditional media.
- Develop communication strategies that consider the diverse needs of all youths, including those with disabilities. How do the blind and deaf access information for opportunities? How inclusive are our civic engagement programs? should be the questions we ask at design stage.
- Remove Barriers to address communication, institutional, environmental and attitudinal barriers that prevent youths with disabilities from participating fully in civic activities and programs.
- Ensure public institutions like schools, hospitals and offices and community services are accessible to all, including those with disabilities.
- Implement and enforce policies that combat discrimination in all its forms, including gender, ethnic, and religious discrimination. Promote a culture of inclusion and respect for diversity.

4. SUPPORT QUALITY EDUCATION, YOUTH ENTREPRENEURSHIP AND EMPLOYMENT

- Provide comprehensive information on starting social enterprises, businesses, and navigating the job market.
- Encourage youths to take the initiative in their own learning and information seeking.
- Re-integrate climate education into school curricula to raise awareness about environmental issues and their impact on communities.

- Support quality education for skill-building, community development and peace to enable youth to engage constructively in civic structures and inclusive political processes; educating young people in human rights and active citizenship, and promoting youth activism and engagement, e.g. through policies strengthening extracurricular learning, youth work and conferences.
- Invest in intergenerational partnerships and learning, for everyone to learn from each other and to allow dialogue and common problem-solving. The mentorship phase of the conference was considered an example of intergenerational partnership and learning.

5. FOSTER AN ENABLING AND SAFE ENVIRONMENT FOR YOUTH ACTIVITIES

- Protect civil spaces, educational institutions and hospitals as spaces free from all forms of violence and ensure accessibility to all youth, including marginalised and disabled youth; and to carry out their work independently and without undue interference, including in situations of armed conflict; and to investigate thoroughly and impartially threats, harassment, and violence against them, to ensure that perpetrators are brought to justice.
- Promote synergies between youth and state actors in fostering healthcare, education, entrepreneurship and civic engagement. This will allow youths to be more conscious and take the state moral rearmament and civic education more seriously.
- Work on improving security in regions to enable youths to engage in various activities safely.
- Decentralized opportunities to ensure opportunities are accessible to youths in peri-urban and rural areas, not just in safer urban centres.

6. REMOVE LEGAL BARRIERS AND FOSTER SUSTAINABLE FUNDING SCHEMES

- Remove any legal barriers affecting the work of youth-led and youth-serving organisations and other civil society actors in health promotion, education, and civic engagement.
- Dedicate specific user-friendly funding schemes, which are easy to apply for and report on, for youths, youth-led and youth-serving organisations for the implementation of entrepreneurial and enterprising endeavours towards local economic development.
- Include youths, youth-led and youth-serving organisations as co-decision-makers in the conception, implementation and evaluation of funding schemes and programmes on education, health, peace and security and civic engagement.
- Ensure that existing funding schemes, such as FOGAJUENE allocate funding for projects that foster health, education, entrepreneurship, peace and civic engagement.
- Ensure sustainable structural funding for youths to allow them to participate in nation building, ownership, and patriotism.
- Provide funding, training, and resources to youth-led and youth-serving organizations to empower them to take active roles in their communities and advocate for their rights.

CHALLENGES FACED AND CONCLUSION

IN THE COURSE OF THE ORGANIZATION OF THIS EVENT THE PROJECT TEAM FACED A NUMBER OF CHALLENGES:

LIMITED FINANCES & PUBLICITY

1. Limited Finances:

This project anticipated a total of 1,000 youths with at least 900 from Buea community with a 4-hour panel session with noteworthy international entrepreneurs, public health experts, business coaches, lawyers and leaders.

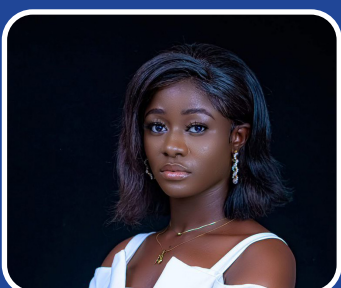
A dialogue phase was to follow with mentors from all works of life (engineering, health, creative art, agriculture, law, entrepreneurship, etc) and diplomatic experts in these fields. Unfortunately we had limited finances to bring more mentors and panelist to talk and share their life-changing experiences with the youth.

2. Limited publicity :

Due to limited funds, we couldn't pay bloggers and other TV stations to announce the event on their platforms which limited our reach on the target population. Thanks to MDDT's partnership with us, they brought in more young people that increased attendance.

CONCLUSION

In spite of the challenges we faced, Make Them Smile Foundation, with the support of MDDT, partners, and team members, successfully hosted the OYOD conference, achieving the desired outcomes. We not only aspired but transformed lives, created a lasting impact, and made a difference.
